Joyful Easter in Czech Republic

This year, the Easter Triduum was celebrated with great joy and enthusiasm throughout the Czech Republic. Last year, due to the pandemic, public Easter services could not be held at all and the baptisms of adults were postponed to Whitsunday.

This year, worshipers followed strict health restrictions, including that churches can only be occupied to 10 percent of their capacity, and pews must be disinfected before and after services. Mass singing, so popular in all Slavic countries, is not allowed. During the Easter Triduum, the government made an exception to the rules of free movement restrictions: they could return to their homes until midnight. As of Maundy Thursday, the curfew from 9 pm did not apply.

Catholic priests responded by organizing additional services. Participants signed up in advance to observe to the 10 percent hygiene limit. As we are informed, the attendance of online services was extremely high this year and we have no doubt that they were watched by many those who do not profess the faith.

The Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren, which is the second largest church in the Czech Republic in terms of the number of participants in services, followed a similar approach.



Many adult baptisms took place in the Catholic and Evangelical Churches during Easter this year.

In the Cathedral of Saints Vitus, Wenceslaus and Adalbert at Prague Castle, which is also the seat of the President of the Czech Republic, Cardinal Dominik Duka, Archbishop of Prague and Primate of Bohemia, baptized and at the same time confirmed four men, two professional soldiers, mostly parishioners of the cathedral parish. One of them was an officer of the Castle Guard, which guards Prague Castle, in the grounds of which the cathedral is located, barracks are also in the parish. Two baptized were prepared in the Prague headquarters of the Prelature of Opus Dei, which is also based near Prague Castle. The Easter Vigil, which lasted three and a half hours, was streamed by cathedral television, which is managed and financed by the Metropolitan Chapter at St. Vitus in Prague (<https://katedrala.tv/>).

His Excellency Mons. Charles Daniel Balvo (standing in the photo on the left), the Apostolic Nuncio in the Czech Republic, took part in all the services of the Easter Triduum in the Prague Cathedral. He aroused the warm sympathy of worshipers and online viewers with his friendly behaviour and knowledge of Czech. On Maundy Thursday 1st April, in the morning during a service renewing priestly vows and sanctifying sacred oils, attended by several hundred priests from the Prague Archdiocese, he delivered a Czech speech, which was received with great sympathy.

Cardinal Duka Supported Bishops in Slovakia

On 1st April 2021, Dominik Cardinal Duka, Archbishop of Prague and Primate of Bohemia, sent a letter to His Excellency Mons. Stanislav Zvolenský, Metropolitan Archbishop of Bratislava and President of the Conference of Bishops of Slovakia, in which he supports the position of the Conference regarding church closures during Easter.

Dear Brother in the Episcopal Service, Father Archbishop and President of the Conference of Bishops of Slovakia,

I am happy to send you greetings from Prague and, at the same time, express my personal support for both you and your common position of the bishops of Slovakia on the situation of services during the coronavirus, especially during the Easter holidays, which are the most important holidays for Christians during the year.

I see with true hope that around the world we can observe a certain uprising of the global episcopate in the defence of the fundamental human rights, which, in accordance with the attitude of Pope Francis, includes religious freedom, and in that, the freedom of cult. In the common state of the Czechs and Slovaks (ČSSR), we were able to know to the core what it means to be persecuted, not liberated and suppressed from the freedom of cult, as well as having restricted the activities of the church in general in public spaces.

Undoubtedly, not only you, the bishops of Slovakia, but also your priests have shown your willingness to fully cooperate with the current leadership of the Slovak Republic, not only while respecting the necessary epidemic measures, but also in helping society as a whole. I appreciate your initiative very much, when the priests of your dioceses – and the first message came from the Archdiocese of Košice – that dozens of priests have joined in to provide auxiliary medical service in hospitals for patients with Covid-19. I remember our meetings together and

our common path towards freedom. I respect also the Slovak Catholicism, which has so many times been able to show good service to both its nation and our continent in the struggle for freedom, which is indivisible. I also remember the well-known Candle manifestation in Bratislava and the large number of pilgrimage festivities that took place in Slovakia before 1989. In the political timelessness at that time, they were, also, an encouragement for us in the Czech Republic. Undoubtedly, it must be said that the famous Velehrad pilgrimage in 1985 would not have the necessary strength that it demonstrated without the participation of pilgrims from Slovakia. To this day, my greatest greeting goes to the believers, women of Orava, whose precious voice became a decisive and remarkable protest.

I remain connected with you all in prayers, especially in support, so that the Slovak Church can fulfil its glorious mission. Worship services at this time are an encouragement to the population and also a vaccine against stress and fear. They give meaning to the human life and to the struggles for the same dignified human life.
